

# *Ben Keith Features in The Times of India | Germany refuses to extradite Albanian 'drug trafficker' to UK citing inhumane conditions in British jails*

Germany has refused to extradite an Albanian alleged drug trafficker to the UK owing to the state of British Prisons.

The higher regional court of Karlsruhe, Southwest Germany, blocked the extradition of the man, accused of trafficking 5kg of cocaine and laundering £330,000, stating the request was "inadmissible" owing to fears he would receive inhumane or degrading treatment in British jail. The decision is ironic as UK extradition barristers frequently slam Indian prisons, claiming overcrowding and prisoner violence to persuade UK judges not to extradite requested persons from the UK to India.

*"Many UK prisons are over 100 years old and severely overcrowded. The lack of funding and investment has led to this judgment. Indian extradition cases in the UK routinely require assurances on Indian prison conditions. The fact the UK cannot provide one is problematic and this judgment shows that the UK has failed on human rights grounds"*
